Temperatures have not been too high which has resulted in an extended flowering season.

The Pom-Pom Tree, Dais cotinifolia, which can start flowering early but is usually looking great over the December period is a rewarding tree we so often overlook!

It does well under most conditions and once established requires very little from us.

There is a lot of blue around at the moment giving gardens a somewhat cool atmosphere.

The most prominent are Agapanthus, Lavender, Lobelia and the Heliotropes which seem to be thriving this year.

If you want those Heliotropes to really excel, plant them in a spot that receives full morning sun or strong dappled light.

This is also the time of the year we can appreciate a special plant and understand why we call it 'Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow'.

Its all about change and moving forward but appreciating the past, living in the present and being positive about the future!

This well known garden subject is also known to some as Morning, Noon and Night!! Or more romantically known as 'Kiss me quick'!!!

It is a native of Brazil so does exude some Latin charm.

They are flowering once again in Cape Town gardens... for some there was an early spring show and now it's starting all over again.

The only reason I can think of, is that we are having a cool summer! It is a very floriferous plant, the flowers start off purple, a day later changing to lavender which fades to white the following day always accompanied by its a heady scent.

It is probably one of the most handsome members of the potato family, hard to believe, I know!! It has never to my knowledge become invasive!!

I have grown them in different climates all over the country and can honestly say they never let you down.

If you don't make your own then buy the best available from the garden centre or other reliable source.

Like any plant, compost is living material so take it seriously

The comment was made the other day... if we find high temperatures a challenge then how on earth do plants cope.

We can't change the temperature but we can manage the situation with a few simple principles.

The most important is good soil management!

Don't disturb it with digging, scratching and scoffling (like a chicken!) just leave it alone and cover it with mulch or growing plant material.

By doing this we are shading the soil, keeping it cool and therefore lowering the temperature by a few degrees.

Good watering practice is essential, water well either early in the morning or in the evening....Think differently!

William James said and I quote...The greatest discovery of any generation is that a human being can alter his life by changing his attitude.

2022 seems a solid number, so lets do the right thing this year!!

Consider all aspects of the garden, not only what we see but far beyond into the natural realm.

I guess you are all a tired about my going on about the role of our gardens in the big scheme of things.... So here is a scrap more... a quote by Peter Karieva, a Conservation Biologist...
